#### **Message from Pastor Tom**



I don't really do New Year's resolutions. If I did, I'd be like most of America - where over 70% of resolutions have failed within two weeks, and over 90% have failed by six weeks. I don't think I am that different than most Americans, so I don't set myself up for failure by making bold declarations of how I am going to transform myself like some short order cook making breakfast - fast and furious.

I don't do resolutions, but I do take time to look back at what I've done over the past year, and where I would like to go in this next year. And with that in front of me every day, I go about life, not in a rush, not trying to meet deadlines, just quietly doing the work when I can. And I am always amazed how much change can happen that way.

I have been here 18 months now. The first six months I hardly changed a thing. I wanted to learn how we did things, why we did things, where the sacred cows lived, and what was important to us and what wasn't. That first six months people here, maybe some of you, kept telling me to change, change, change. Six months in and I began. And you probably didn't even notice. But stop and look at things and there has been a lot of change. Our altar area has changed. Use of music and new prayers are part of our service that were not there. I'm told we are more efficient doing the business of the church. Way more people come to me now with their personal issues. Some new people are in new places, bringing new energy to committees and the work we do. We have begun to look ahead in a way we had not before. I'm really proud of all of you as you adjusted and jumped in and encouraged each other.

It is tempting, as a new pastor, to walk into a church like a tornado and try to change everything during the honeymoon phase, the first few months. But I like to use the apostles as my guide to change.

Most of the apostles traveled into the world of Rome after the resurrection. But they didn't leap out and become missionaries. And when they did become missionaries, most did not walk into a town with zeal and try to change everything. They built small gatherings, tiny home churches, and let them work, and moved on to the next town. And so Christianity grew, but not like a wildfire. No, it grew slow and steady and always concerned that the members of these churches were deeply grounded in the truth of Christ. They traveled, spoke their faith, shared their faith and allowed God to change hearts. They did not feel compelled to browbeat people into faith. They loved them into faith.

I like to think that that is where we are as a church. Like it or not, we are missionaries. We are in the least churched state in the Union. But that does not mean people don't need church. They do. Church helps us learn more deeply, worship more meaningfully, helps us navigate an angry world, help others more effectively, reduce our anxieties, support each other when things get hard, and rejoice with each other when times are good. You know people who need those things in their lives, and those things come through a relationship with God. They come with accepting the Grace and love of Jesus. You who are reading this know all these things. You've lived them. And when we talk about them, we become missionaries.

So we are missionaries. Our church has grown by a little over 10% since I have been here. That's good. But that's not enough. We have something important to share. A love and acceptance of each other that I do not find at many churches. Over and over I talk to people wounded by the church. I talk to people who felt far more judgment than grace. But want our church to be different. "Love. No exceptions." is not a motto. It is a challenge.

Don't worry about the timetables of growth in a new year. Love people, and they will come. Share your faith story and they will come. Live your faith, and they will come, just like what happened in the early church. I see a lot of changes coming over the next couple of years. Some of them logistical or practical. But more of them coming by your enthusiasm for the God we worship, for the church we choose to worship in. We don't have to evangelize. We do it with our lives and words of faith. Then letting God work.

So keep up your good work. Keep living your faith. Speak your faith and what God has done for you. When we do, growth happens. Ours, and those around us. Because God is at work, but often, only if we are.

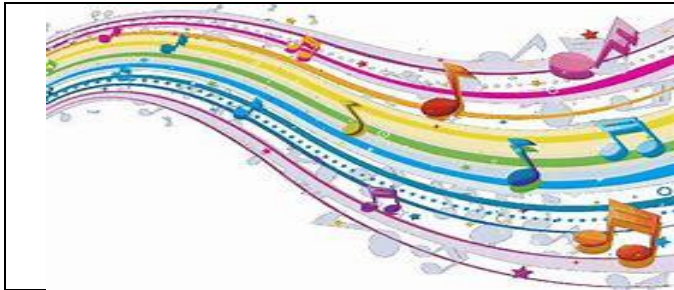
We welcome others to join us. Just contact us to talk about it or volunteer.

For 2025, we received \$79,151 in identified and loose plate tithes and offerings, averaging \$6,596 monthly. This was only \$349 short of what was budgeted for the year! For 2026, however, we will need an average of \$7,417 monthly to keep up with expenses and remain on target. We honor the Lord by helping RUMC sustain its good work in serving. 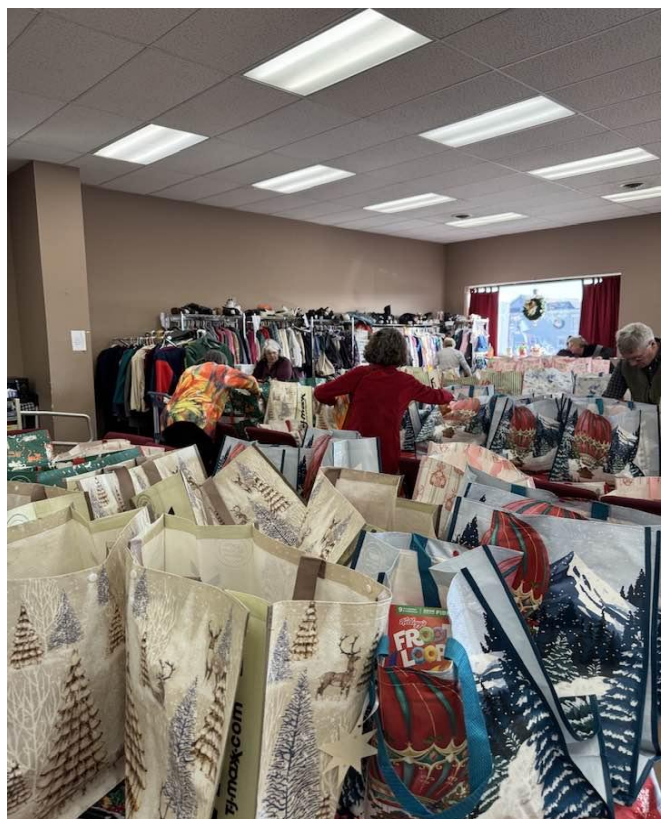
